Walk from the Shed every Monday and Wednesday mornings at 08:00. All members welcome to join in!


GOLFING:

The workshop has been very quiet over the Christmas and New Year break with very few jobs coming in from the public. Several members have been busy with their own projects.





Recipe

San choy bow, Chinese lettuce wraps

These Chinese lettuce wraps are easy to make, filled with flavour and a great appetizer. Prep Time 10 minutes mins. Cook Time 10 minutes mins. Total Time 20 minutes mins Servings: 6 approx., or less if more of a meal

Ingredients:

For sauce

1 tablespoon oyster sauce; 1 tablespoon Shaoxing wine; ½ tablespoon soy sauce; ½ teaspoon sesame oil:

For rest of dish:

450 g ground pork; 60g water chestnuts strained weight, approx. ½ can; ½ onion small; 1 spring onion; ½ tablespoon fresh ginger grated/minced; 1 clove garlic grated/minced; 30g shitake mushrooms (optional);

1 iceberg lettuce small, may not use all; 2 teaspoon vegetable oil:

Instructions:

- 1. In a small bowl, mix together the oyster sauce, Shaoxing wine, soy sauce and sesame oil. Set aside for later.
- 2. Drain the water chestnuts and chop the slices into small pieces. Dice the onion relatively finely and slice the spring onion. Have your grated or minced ginger and garlic ready to go as well. Break off pieces of lettuce to make cups (they can be whole, smaller leaves or parts of big leaves you just want them a good size and shape to hold the meat and eat from). You'll need approx. 12 or maybe more to use all the filling. Chop the shitake relatively small, if using.
- 3. Warm the vegetable oil in a wok or skillet/frying pan then add the onion and cook for a minute or two before adding the ginger and garlic. Cook for a couple minutes, stirring regularly, until the onion is softened.
- 4. Add the ground pork and cook for approx. 5 minutes, stirring regularly, until the meat is cooked through. Add the shitake mushrooms, if using, and cook a minute or two more. Add the water chestnuts and mix through.
- 5. Add the sauce you mixed earlier and cook a minute as you mix it through then remove from heat. Spoon the mixture into your lettuce cups and top with the chopped spring onions then serve.

Do you have a recipe to share??

Wayne and wife Betty are on an extended caravan trip around Australia. They are presently the caretakers at the old Bennetts Hardware premises in Gosnells. The place is being converted for 'Sam's Spares' which has outgrown their space at Jacaranda House for the computer repair business. It was good to meet up with Wayne who will hopefully stop by again before they head off on their caravan journey.

We celebrated last night with a couple of adult beverages Metamucil and Ensure. You know you are getting old when, friends with benefits, means having someone who can drive at night.

Weight loss goal: To be able to clip my toenails and breathe at the same time.

Men's Shed Triptique:

With a favourable weather window, we lifted anchor and set our sails west towards the Abrolhos Islands, our first stop on our return to Cairns, North Queensland. That was February last year and my wife, Sue and I had just finished preparing and provisioning our 39-foot sailing catamaran that had been in Geraldton safely tucked away for the cyclone season.



A week spent in the windy Abrolhos Islands was all we could afford and soon we sailed into Denham, Shark Bay where we me up with our daughter, son in law and the two grand kids for a week cruising around Dirk Hartog Island and Shelter Bay.

Deadlines loomed. We had to be in Exmouth for the start of Gamex 2023, as I was part of a 4-man game fishing team that we had entered in a mate's small boat. As first-time entrants, we were green and struggled, but I got my marlin, a 3.5kg queenfish on 2kg line, a 1kg spangled emperor on 1kg line and dropped a large mahimahi on 2kg line. Not doing well, (the locals are very good) we switched to Tag & Release Shark, tagging sharks on 1kg, 2kg, 3kg, 4kg, 5kg, 6kg, 8kg, 10kg, 15kg, 24kg and 32kg line, winning us the Highest Point Scoring Tag & Release Shark prize as well as Highest Point Scoring First Timers.



After 7 days of hard fishing, I was exhausted and we spent a few days recovering, anchored in a calm bay of the beautiful Serrurier Island. Fishing was good and we experienced close up encounters with turtles on the beach.



My bucket list destination, the Montebello Islands was only a day's sail away and we found extraordinary calm secluded anchorages amongst the labyrinth of channels and islands that abound there. Luckily, we were there for a rare total eclipse that was forecast to put Exmouth on the tourist map. We were able to experience this event from the top of a nearby hilltop amongst the debris of the British nuclear test detonation that these islands are known for. Just then we discovered a very late cyclone was forming and heading our way. Forecasts showed it would cross inland at the 80 Mile Beach, which was good, but if not, it would come right over us. We moved location to a very well protected area and waited it out. The cyclone crossed 25 miles off and 12 hours later than the weather report showed 10 days prior! I thought that was pretty good forecasting!



With fresh food running very low we set our sails for Dampier, where we re-provisioned and bought StarLink Satellite Communication. Now, what a game changer! We could get 5G internet anywhere we went, and cheaper than our clunky slow Iridium Sat phone!





Broome was next and the Kimberley's. Now this is remote. However there were still quite a few other yachts and tourist boats around and the social life was good. Very friendly anchorages and we spent many evenings having sundowners on other yachts or hosting others back on ours. We viewed the magnificent rock art, the deep river gorges, Horizontal Falls, Montgomery Reef, 6 metre tides, currents, crocodiles, mud flats, mosquitos, mangroves and sand flies. It's a wild, remote place.





After 2 months we arrived in Darwin and did a major fresh food resupply. We had been eating lots of easily available fresh fish, but fresh vegetables are a premium! From Darwin we worked our way across Arnhem Land to Elcho Island, a dry aboriginal settlement where my son in law's brother and wife were working. Not a normal stop for yachts unless one is invited, so we were a bit of a novelty to the local kids.



We were invited to go with a few locals to collect mangrove worms. We arrived at a thickly forested mangrove area at low tide and walked through thick mud. Using an axe, the dead mangrove logs would be hacked open revealing long thick worm shaped molluscs that they either ate on the spot or collected in containers for later. I think, according to my taste buds, the best part was the mud flavoured intestines!

In Gove, a delightful anchorage, quite a few of our friendly yacht neighbours that we met in the Kimberly, were also there at the same time; we waited for a decent weather window to make the 3-day crossing of the "Confused Seas" of the Gulf of Carpentaria. It's a bitch of passage as the wind blows easterly and the tide/current flows north/south and the waves don't know which way to go other than up and down making it very uncomfortable most of the time. After waiting for a couple of weeks we decided to make our way down to *Groote* Eylandt, another bucket list location for me, while we waited, and to give us a better wind angle for the crossing.

Before we got to *Groote* Eylandt, the weather turned perfect and the seas were glassy for 3 days, leaving us no option but to motor-sail for 3 days across the gulf to the small town of Seisia on the Queensland west coast just south of Cape York.

Cape York is an interesting place and from our protected anchorage we could see a continuous trail of people scrambling along a rough track to the sign that is erected at the tip notifying the adventurer of the significance of the spot as the most northern point of mainland Australia.

By now it is early October and, according to the wind conditions, still a bit early to be heading south along the Great Barrier Reef, but it must be done as we had an appointment date to meet our youngest son in Cairns in early November; we were treating him to a 10-day cruise out to the reef. We battled against tide and winds making short hops when we could and got held up for 10 days in Bathurst Bay, sheltering from 35 knot howling winds. When the weather settled, we set off again towards Lizard Island for an overnight sail.

Disaster strike around 6.30 pm when one of the water level hatches blew out leaving a gaping hole letting volumes of water into the hull. We immediately dropped sails and heaved to. While the bilge pumps struggled to keep up, I set about a repair with some heavy plywood and screws from the inside, securing the gaping hole. However as soon as we motored forward to find a safe anchorage, the wave pressure ripped the screws out with more water pouring in. Five times I attempted a repair with no

luck and eventually resorted to holding the board closed with my foot while my wife drove the boat 3 miles at 3 knots to a safe anchorage at 2.30am.

Next morning, and thanks to Starlink, we had phone communication to the outside world from our very remote anchorage. 000 got me in touch with water police, and I explained our situation. They said they would get back to me. Later I got a call from a Cape Flattery Silica Mine, 11 miles away, who sent a full sheet of 15mm marine ply, 6 tubes of underwater setting silicone and a box of extralarge gauge tech screws that I had requested; a life saver! The following morning, we gingerly set off for Cairns and found that the silicone and screws were holding well!

In Cairns we permanently fibre glassed over both hatches and painted to a professional finish. That was not going to happen again!

My son arrived on schedule as we relaunched into Trinity Inlet and by chance the weather was perfect for the next 10 days. We showed him the tourist sights at Fitzroy Island, Vlasoff Cay, Sudbury Cay, Arlington Reef, Low Islands, Double Island and eventually back to Cairns. We had great fishing, snorkelling, beach walking, rainforest treks and experienced close encounters with turtles, fish and seabirds.





With the season at an end, we decommissioned the boat and left her on a hardstand in Cairns and returned to Perth just ahead of a cyclone heading that way, to spend time with our daughter, grandkids and the Men's Shed, until we return in April for our next adventure to New Caledonia.

The clerk then asked, "Was it before or after the Kornmehl episode?"




