Recipe

Big Brekky Frittata



YIELDS 6 Servings PREP TIME 15 mins COOK TIME 45 minsTOTAL TIME 1 hr

Ingredients:

6 cup mushrooms, 1cm sliced; 200 g bacon rashers; 6 thin sausages or 8 chipolata

sausages; 4 cloves garlic, crushed; 120 g baby spinach 1 punnet cherry tomatoes, halved; 8 eggs; ½ cup cream;

Cracked pepper; ½ cup cheddar cheese, grated:

Instructions:

1. Preheat the oven to 200°C and line a baking dish with greaseproof paper.

- 2. In a large frying pan over medium-high heat, add the bacon and sausages. Cook for 3-4 minutes or until seared and lightly browned. Remove from the pan and set aside in the prepared baking dish.
- 3. Return the frying pan to the heat. Add garlic and cook for 1 minute. Add mushrooms and cook for 2-3 minutes then add spinach and cook for a further 1-2 minutes or until wilted. Remove from the heat and transfer to the baking dish with the bacon and sausages. Add cherry tomatoes to the baking dish.
- 4. Place eggs and cream in a large bowl and whisk to combine. Add grated cheese and season with pepper.
- 5. Pour the egg mixture over the ingredients in the baking dish.
- 6. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until golden on top and set in the centre. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the dish before removing and slicing.

Household power failure – trouble shooting!

Sometime around Christmas / New Year, one morning, my wife commented as she left the house that the numbers were not showing on the electric clock.

The lights were still on in the family room so I assumed a failure in a power circuit. Without really putting the brain into gear I then assumed the fault was caused by the evaporative air condition which I had just turned on. (Being a stinking hot day.) A check in the meter box revealed the RCD had operated cutting off the power. There are two power circuit CB's but neither had tripped.

There is no separate CB for the evaporative air conditioner so it could not be easily isolated. In the old installation there was an external switch and socket under the roof mounted unit and easily accessible. So I went up onto the roof to check. (I am banned from going on the roof these days!) Not in this installation. So I called a local electrician who had done some work for us. Fortunately as it turned out, he could not come, neither could the AC maintenance man. A friend on my Daughters came around and unplugged the air conditioner inside the roof cavity.







Power CB's

In the meter box attempting to reset the RCD did not work, so it was not the A/C. Switching both CB's off allowed the RCD to be reset. One power CB could be reset OK. But when the other was reset the RCD immediately disconnected the power.

The CB causing the problem is for the side of the house which is the kitchen etc. So rethinking the problem we disconnected all those electrical devices in the kitchen. One at a time they were reinstalled. Problem turned out to be the electric kettle. So our fix was to go and buy a new electric kettle for about \$40 and to bin the dead one, after I had cut the power cord from its base so it could not be used. Defect was probably within the kettle its self.

But that was cheaper than having a visit from the electrician.

A calmer approach to the trouble shooting in the first instance rather than assuming it to be the A/C would have meant less stress and a quicker resolution of the problem and me not getting in the shit for going up on the roof!

Why I am banned from going up on the roof!

We all have a ladder /roof story. This, for what it is worth is mine!

Can't remember the year but it was before Fiona Stanley Hospital was built but that is immaterial. My wife Jen was away visiting her Sisters in Balingup so I decided to clean out the gutters using the electric blower which is quite effective. My ladder is an old one I got from my father, who passed about 40 years back, and is an extending wooden type which I keep on a couple of hooks at the side of the house behind the tool shed. I had successfully completed cleaning the gutters and had lowered the blower onto a bench at the side of the house. I then started to descend the ladder and when my shoulders were about level with the gutter the ladder started to slide sideways. I probably should have just stayed on the ladder because in hindsight I think it would have only slid until the shed stopped it. Anyway I decided I had to dismount the ladder and drop to the concrete slab area below, probably less than 2 metres. Back around the year 2000 I had undergone surgery on my spine to fix a problem and decided that I could not just land on my feet because I did not want to jar my spine. So I figured I had to absorb the impact by just crumpling to the ground. Good theory but as part of this process I stuck my left arm / hand out to support myself as I crumpled onto the concrete slabs. Result being I felt I had broken my wrist! The neighbours, I think, learnt some new words! In addition I had a pair of garden secateurs in a leather holster on my left hip on which I landed. That was a deep bruise! I figured I need to go to hospital and get my wrist checked out. So how to achieve that. I did not think I would be able to, or should drive. Daughter Caroline lives the closest but it was a Saturday afternoon and an Eagles home game. She is a long time Eagles member so would not be home. Justin, eldest Son, lives next closes but he was doing Crowd control / Security working in Subiaco so that was not the answer. Probably should have called 000 but did not want that sort of fuss. So phoned other Son, Alistair who lived the furthest away. Asked if he was doing anything as I felt I needed to visit a hospital emergency department. He did have a blind date to go to dinner that evening but put that off

Probably should have gone to Armadale Hospital. I could not believe it but on a Saturday afternoon Murdock did not have anybody on duty who could take an x-ray. But they plastered up my left wrist 'just in case' and told me to come back Monday for an x-ray. Bit hard to conceal the plaster cast on my arm so eagle eyed wife spots it when she arrives back home on the Sunday afternoon. So the depth of the crap I was in became very deep and I have been banned from getting onto the roof. I do not remember much sympathy!

Added to that is an age component as I go OBE shortly. Problem is the body is knackered but the mind still has delusions of being 40 years younger!

My old wooden ladder probably should be in a museum. It is a family heirloom!


